

Our Roots are in Milk




January 1, 1910

New York Requires Pasteurization of Milk

As cities began to industrialize, milk production and distribution became more unsanitary. This was the cause of many milkborne diseases, which were commonly fatal. Unsanitary milk caused illnesses such as typhoid fever, scarlet fever, and diphtheria. In 1910, the New York City Board of Health issued an order requiring the pasteurization of milk in hopes of reducing pathogens and diseases in milk. Other states followed throughout the next decade.

1911 - Milwaukee, WI

- In 1911 a group of men, that had a mutual interest in the improvement of the <u>sanitary production and</u> <u>distribution of milk</u> and its products the US gathered in Milwaukee, Wisconsin to review the sanitary problems in the dairy industry and <u>devise a procedure to correct the distribution of unsanitary dairy products world wide</u>.
- Many cities and states had passed regulations requiring that sanitary procedures and conditions be followed in order to prevent the spread of disease., but <u>not standardized</u>
- The <u>goal</u> of the group was to standardize, and the <u>International Association of Dairy and Milk Inspectors</u> was organized.
- The first United States "Pure Food and Drug Law" had just been passed and the need for such an organization as this was needed to <u>assist the industry in the teaching and training of the methods necessary to comply with these new laws</u>.
- The first Annual Convention to begin this process was held in 1912



1930's – Appiliates Were Established

- Original Name of IAFP "The International Association of Dairy and Milk Inspectors"
- The Journal of Milk Technology was the official publication in 1937
- In 1938 the associations name was changed to the International Association of Milk Sanitarians



Continued Change and Growth of the Organization

- In 1941 The International Association of Dairy and Milk Inspectors grew to 1146 members from 43 states & a few foreign counties
- In 1947 to further include Food and Restaurant sanitarians, name changed to International Association of Milk & Food Sanitarians (IAMFS), with additional of "Environmental" (IAMFES) in 1963
- In 1996 Changed to International Association for Food Protection

We have one annual meeting (Yakima, Wenatchee, Chelan)




43rd Annual Convention September 1956 Olympic Hotel Seattle, WA




Annual Convention August 9 – 13th 1981 Sheraton – Spokane

June 30 - July 3rd, 1996 - Sheraton Hotel and Towers Seattle, WA


Lots of HARD work by many WMFSA affiliate members. Over \$10,000 proceeds most of which was transferred into the Scholarship fund

- After his passing in 2014 WAFP, the Luedecke Family and others created the Endowed Scholarship










Some of my Mentors

- Served as Co-chair for the 1996 International Meeting


